Raúl Castellanos



Raúl Castellanos Gómez, Ph.D. in architecture and senior lecturer in architectural design at the Valencia School of Architecture (Spain). His research activity has been awarded prizes in the 7th Competition Arquia/ thesis (2009), the FAD Awards for Thought and Criticism (2013) and the 14th Biennial of Architecture and Urbanism (2018). He authored the book "Plan Poché", and has contributed to architectural journals such as DPA, EGA, PPA, En Blanco, Palimpsesto, The Architectural Review, ARQ: Arquitectura Diseño Urbanismo, Dearq, arq: Architectural Research Quarterly, RITA and Varia. He has co-curated the exhibitions: "Mat-building: Frankfurt, Berlin, Venecia, Kuwait, Valencia" and "Le Corbusier: Paris n'est pas Moscou".

Domèstiques



Domèstiques is a research laboratory that promotes housing cooperatives under transfer of use. The laboratory's main objective is to root this housing model to the Valencian context throughout a combination of research and action. We aim to develop this task together with different local stakeholders, including the vision of the quadruple helix: public administration, private sector, academia, civil society. Our main objective is to popularise the model. We research innovations that reduce the existing barriers to the model, promote its understanding and acceptance among citizens, in a bid to encourage greater participation in such initiatives.

Domèstiques is an initiative launched by Crearqció coop.v. with the collaboration of El Rogle coop.v. research group Projectes Arquitectònics-UPV.

Fent Estudi



Fent Estudi Coop. V. is a Valencian cooperative formed by architects, urban planners and technicians. It was founded in 2016 by Eva Raga, Isabel González and Francisco Azorín. We carry out studies and projects that involve the active participation of citizens and the use of locally available resources, with the aim of creating fairer and more inclusive urban architectural environments. We are motivated by the creation of mutually beneficial relationships between people and their built environment, aware that stakeholder participation is vital to achieve holistic knowledge and understanding in each context, and to deliver outcomes that respond to the needs of both a particular place and the people who live there. In recent years, we have specialised in urban and social innovation processes, as well as in the development of multidisciplinary methodologies, driven by the desire to seek new ways of seeing and working in diverse contexts.

María Flores



María Flores Fillol holds a degree in architecture from the Universitat Politècnica de València (Spain). Her bachelor thesis carried out at the University of Milan (Italy) faced the challenge of transforming some old industrial buildings into an extension of the university campus. She started her professional career as a freelance architect, managing several public consultation projects commissioned by the Regional Governement of Valencia. Subsequently, she joined the public administration holding a management position in the Railway Infrastructure Management entity of the Generalitat Valenciana.

Subsequently, she was promoted to Head of the Architecture Division of the Ports and Transport Management Entity of the government. She managed the implementation and execution of major infrastructure projects and designed and supervised public tenders and bids. Her latest position within the government is that of Head of Assets in the Social Housing Division. Her main tasks consist of the commissioning and implementation of both industrial and residential projects, together with the monitoring and supervision of public concessions based on pre-established guidelines encompassing social criteria.

Anne Kockelkorn



Anne Kockelkorn is Assistant Professor of Architecture and Dwelling in the Department of Architecture, Faculty of Architecture and the Built Environment. Her research in urban and architectural history is focused on the intersections between design, territorial politics and processes of subjectivation. Her forthcoming monograph "The Social Condenser II" investigates the transformation of housing production in France before and after the neoliberal reforms of 1977, for which she won the ETH Silver Medal for outstanding doctoral theses in 2018. She has published widely on German and French housing histories in the 20th century and was co-editor of "Housing after the Neoliberal Turn: International Case Studies", (Spector Books, 2015) and "Productive Universals-Specific Situations. Critical Engagements in Art, Architecture, and Urbanism" (Sternberg Press, 2019, with Nina Zschocke). Together with Susanne Schindler and Rebekka Hirschberg, she is currently preparing the book "Cooperative Conditions: A Primer on Architecture, Finance and Regulation in Zurich" (Zurich: gta Verlag).

Iker Marcaide



Iker Marcaide is an impact entrepreneur and impact investor. Currently, he leads the Zubi Group, where he works to solve social and environmental challenges such as climate change, the creation of a circular economy and poverty alleviation, mobilising talent and investors to create companies and investment fund.

In 2009 he founded Flywire (previously known as peerTransfer) between Spain and USA, and ran it as CEO until 2013, creating a global leader in international education payments. This project won him the TR35 Prize, awarded by the Technology Review magazine of the Massachusetts Institute of Technology (MIT) in the United States to the best innovators. In 2018 Flywire was chosen as The Next Billion Dollar Company by Forbes, and in 2021. Flywire has been the first company with Spanish origins to be listed onNasdaq (May 2021, \$3.5bn market cap).

Iker holds an MBA and a Master in Operations Management from MIT and an Industrial Engineering degree from the Universitat Politècnica de València. He is also an investor and board member in several companies in Spain and the USA, as well as a trustee of the Nest Social Foundation.

César D. Mifsut



César D. Mifsut García, Valencia (1966), Ph.D. in architecture, specialising in urban planning. In 1997, he was awarded third prize in the international workshop "Chorus: Cercle de l'Eau" in Cran-Gévrier (France), European Programme for the Inclusion of Young Professionals, in an urban form and housing contest. Individual practice of architecture from 1994 to 2008. Since 2016, member of the technical team of EVha-Entitat Valenciana d'Habitatge i Sòl. From 2006 to 2015, technical director of the Cabanyal-Canyamelar technical office, and from 2000 to 2006 architect of the RIVA-Ciutat Vella office working on listed heritage and coordinating European projects in networks of historic centres. 2004-10, associate professor in the Department of Urban Planning at the UPV. 2008-17, guest lecturer in the AAPUD Master and since 2018 in the RERU Master. Founding member of ISUF-H (International Hispanic Urban Form Seminar), 2015, and speaker at ISUF, ISUF-H and ISUF-Italy congresses. Doctoral thesis on urban renewal in the case of "Avenida del Oeste" in Valencia completed in 2016. Co-author of publications of the Valencia Architects' Council on urban and architectural heritage in the city and region of Valencia.

Miguel Ángel Navarrete



Miguel Ángel Navarrete is an architect, exhibition designer and art historian. After working for Barcelona-based scenographer and exhibition designer Ignasi Cristià, he settled in Valencia, where he is now in charge of designing and supervising the production of several exhibitions for the Prehistoric Museum of Valencia, the Archaeological Museum of Gandía and the new Iberian Museum of Olocau. As an academic, he has focused on aesthetics and cultural studies at the intersections of different disciplines. Some of his publications and conference contributions include: "Science, Art and the Absolute.

Integration and redemption in Asturian hydroelectric power stations", "The French literary salon and the distribution of symbolic capital", and "Towards an iconology of connotation in architecture. Continuity of Aby Warburg's legacy through the works of Juan Antonio Ramírez". He is also the author of articles such as "Botticelli's Atelier" for the magazine "Muy Arte".

Blanca Pedrola

Blanca Pedrola graduated as architect and planner at the Universitat Politècnica de València in 2005, and received a Master in Architectural Engineering from the Illinois Institute of Technology, Chicago, in 2007. Since 2008, she has been working developing urban research and innovation projects relating aspects of sustainability in the social and environmental field. She has carried out her professional career in architecture and urban planning studios in the United States, Germany and Netherlands. She worked on the design and construction of large-scale urban projects, and in the development of strategic urban plans, community plans and sustainable urban development strategies. Since 2021 she teaches "Sustainability in Architecture and Urban Design" in the Master in Architecture of the Universidad Cardenal Herrera CEU. Her research interest focuses on the nexus between urban solutions and social justice as a solution for achieving urban resilience.

Jordi Quiñonero



Jordi Quiñonero Oltra completed a degree in sociology at the University of Alicante in 2000, with a specialisation in urban sociology. Subsequently, he took courses related to strategic planning and participatory processes and obtained in 2009 the degree of Expert in Planning Participatory Processes and the Master in Participatory Planning for Local Development, both degrees at the Complutense University of Madrid and with a mention of excellence. In 2014 he obtained the Master's Degree in Community Participation and Development from the University of the Basque Country with a thesis graded with distinction. His interests focus on the study of urban strategies and their interrelation with the social structure and the design of participatory methodologies. He currently carries out his professional activity within the monoDestudio cooperative (www. monodestudio.es), participates as an expert in the Mirror Group of the European Mission of Cities and is also a member of the Board of Directors of the Societat Catalana d'Ordenació del Territori (SCOT).

Irene Reig



Irene Reig Alberola is an architect and civic designer based in Valencia, Spain. A member of CARPE since 2012, a design studio that works from a transdisciplinary and collaborative approach in urban innovation, citizen participation and collective housing. Since 2016, she has formed part of CivicWise, an international network that promotes citizen engagement developing projects based on collective intelligence and open design which involve citizens as stakeholders. Her work focuses on the implementation of these methodologies in urban projects at different scales, including participatory district strategies, co-design processes in public spaces, generation and evaluation of Citizen Labs and community management for cooperative projects.

Bruno Sauer



Bruno Sauer (Antwerp, 1971) graduated as architect at the Henri van de Velde School of the University of Antwerp and continued his studies with master's degrees in urban planning and architecture at the Universitat Politècnica de Catalunya. After six years of collaboration with the team of Pich Architects, he started his own office in Valencia. His professional career as an architect puts the focus on urban development plans, combining architectural design and research and innovation, with an exclusive focus on climate change adaptation and human comfort. Between 2003 and 2017 he lectured at both the Universitat Politècnica de València and the European University of Valencia. He has been guest professor and speaker at several European universities. In 2011 he joined the Green Building Council España-GBCe as technical director. In 2015 he became CEO of GBCe and since 2016 he is member of the board of directors of the WorldGBC. He is cofounder of the European think tank G17 (www.g17.eu) and the global network Building Sense Now (www.buildingsensenow.com). He is vicechair and co-founder of the European non-for-profit organization CPEA (www.cpea.eu).

Adolfo Vigil



Adolfo Vigil de Insaust, Ph.D. in architecture and lecturer in the department of urban planning of the Universitat Politècnica de València (Spain). He specialises in landscape research, focusing on the transformation of waterscapes and the impact in the perception of inhabitants. He has published articles and conference papers on these topics. His work as designer focuses on the development of new parks and gardens through participatory processes by transforming parking lots into new urban spaces and streets into new green corridors in derelict districts, mostly in the city of Valencia.
